Senior Crimestoppers Program Debuts at Broadway House

Broadway House welcomed its Senior Crimestoppers Program during a Charter Membership Presentation on June 29th at the facility. Representatives from the founding organization, Senior Housing Crime Prevention Foundation, the sponsor, Regal Bank, community members, residents and staff learned about the program and the benefits it brings to Broadway House.

Senior Crimestoppers is national crime prevention and quality of life program administered by the Senior Housing Crime Prevention Foundation headquartered in Memphis, TN and is funded by the banking industry through the Federal Community Reinvestment Act. Broadway House was selected by Regal Bank, Livingston, NJ, to be their program recipient.

Senior Crimestoppers represents a unique partnership alliance formed for the good of a common cause: the safety, security and protection against theft and crime for residents, staff, family and visitors of long-term care facilities, assisted and independent living communities, HUD housing and veteran's homes. Charter Membership includes personal lock boxes for resident property, signage, program education and a Tips Line Call Center, an anonymous call outlet staffed 24/7/365 by counselors trained in crime reporting. Additionally, Regal Bank will provide an annual "Wish Comes True" grant to be used for a quality of life project for the residents.

it as a benefit that sets Broadway House apart from other long-term care organizations," said Broadway House President/CEO James Gonzalez. "We didn't accept this program because we have a crime problem; we want to **prevent crime** from ever taking hold here."

Broadway House is the first organization in Newark to participate in Senior Crimestoppers.

Embarking on New Roads in Dementia Care

Over 3 million new cases of dementia are reported in the US each year. Dementia is a syndrome usually of a chronic or progressive nature caused by a variety of brain illnesses that affect memory, thinking, behavior and the ability to perform everyday activities. Alzheimer's Disease is the most common form of dementia.

Many Broadway House residents suffer from dementia due to depression, substance abuse and medication side effects among others. In order to provide culturally competent, safe care for this growing population, Broadway House is implementing training and policies to assist staff in working with residents with dementia.

To develop a Dementia Care Program, Broadway House has partnered with educational professionals to provide opportunities for staff and other healthcare providers to achieve certification as a Certified Dementia Practitioner through the National Council of Certified Dementia Practitioners. A well-attended Dementia Care Workshop was held at Broadway House in June sponsored by Longtree Associates and Serenity Hospice Care. Additional workshops will be planned for future dates.

"Until There's a Cure, Take the Tour"

Staff participated in a "Virtual Dementia Tour" created by Second Wind Dreams, a national not-for-profit agency. The Tour is an individual experience through simulated dementia created to provide a better understanding of the physical and mental challenges of those with dementia. The Tour will become a mandatory in-service.

"After experiencing this training, you have a greater understanding of what living with dementia is like," said Activities Director Nestor Beard who ran the program and attended special training himself. "Learning to create a positive environment for those with dementia can only come from attempting to walk in their shoes."

Remembering Jimmy

Jimmy Gonzalez was a beloved member of the Broadway House staff. He was admired by many until his young life was cut short in a terrible motorcycle accident. To honor his memory and at the same time give back to the community, his aunt, Anita Soto, began donating bicycle helmets to students at Ridge Street Elementary in Newark where Jimmy went to school.

The Jimmy Gonzalez Foundation was founded by Ms. Soto and this is the first year the program officially began spreading bicycle safety awareness. The NJ Rutgers Police and University Hospital's Injury Prevention and Outreach department assisted Jimmy's family in providing the elementary school students with helmets. Ms. Soto stated that she plans on expanding the program and reaching out to other schools in Newark.

Attending the event for Broadway House was Nestor Beard, director of activities. Broadway House will continue to show its support of the helmet donation by attending the bicycle safety event each year.
