Broadway House President/CEO Receives Distinguished Service Award

t their Annual Meeting on June 1st, the American College of Healthcare Executives of NJ presented Broadway House President/ CEO James R. Gonzalez, MPH, FACHE, LNHA, with the organization's **Distinguished Service Award.**

The award is presented annually to an individual who has made a significant contribution or had an impact on healthcare in NJ and the field of healthcare in general. It takes into consideration both the individual's commitment and long-term performance in improving the delivery of care in the state.

Opened in 1995 to address Newark's AIDS epidemic. Mr. Gonzalez and his healthcare team have transformed Broadway House's HIV program into a nationally recognized facility that maintains a Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) 5 Star Rating (the highest rating) and recently received a clinically deficiency-free NJ Department of Health annual survey.

In the past 39 years, Mr. Gonzalez has held executive positions in academic health centers, community hospitals and long-term care facilities in NJ and NY. In 2011, he was asked to serve as interim president/ CEO of University Hospital in Newark in addition to his management of Broadway House. He was appointed the new CEO of University Hospital in 2013 and led the hospital's transition from a university-owned facility to an independent standalone medical center, remain the primary teaching hospital for Rutgers Medical School and become an

entity of the State. It was the largest merger of 2 university systems (UMDNJ and Rutgers) in the history of the country.

In his acceptance speech, Mr.
Gonzalez said, "In the mire of mergers and acquisitions and health insurance chaos, it is important that we stay grounded to the mission at hand and remember who our customers are, our patients, for whom we serve and care for."

Broadway House for Continuing Care recently concluded its annual survey with the **New Jersey Department of Health** resulting in a clinically deficiency-free survey.

The State of New Jersey annually inspects licensed and certified healthcare facilities to ensure the safety of patients and residents and a consistently high quality of care.

We have also received a **5 Star Quality Rating** (highest rating) from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. The rating system is to help consumers, families and caregivers compare nursing homes more easily and to help identify areas about which they may want to ask questions.

Additionally, Broadway House/New Beginnings, has received **Providigm's Basic QAPI Accreditation for 2017** as a skilled nursing facility actively performing Quality Assurance and Performance Improvement activities. Just over 300 centers in the United States earned this accreditation for 2017.

We are so proud to have achieved these high ratings and accreditations. It confirms our commitment to continually strive to improve that care we provide and to ensure our quality systems are sound.

On May 18, we held our inaugural RED TIE GALA in the Rotunda and Ballroom right here at Broadway House. The evening was a huge success raising over \$90,000 that will be used for resident programming and upgrades to our living and working environments.
